Henry's Horrible Hot Spot

ot spots...the awful result of a pig rubbing its face over and over because of pesky flies. Last year was the worst fly season ever and the number of hot spots we treated was crazy. The one who suffered the most and the longest was Henry. The flies are attracted to the fluid that pigs naturally



secrete from their eyes. The itchy, irritating flies lead to rubbing on anything and everything which Henry did to the point of creating a deep wound on his face. Despite ointments, medication and fly repellent, he

kept rubbing until it got infected and a trip to the vet was necessary to do a deep cleaning. That was the first of many trips to the clinic.

In the first exam under anesthesia, the vet found that Henry's wound went down to the bone. It was debrided and flushed then a calcium alginate dressing inserted with a patch sutured over it. The next week Henry returned to the clinic for a cleaning and redo of the patch then repeated that procedure weekly throughout September. On the last of those visits, the hole was closing over the bone and only a putty was used to cover the wound. It was believed that Henry was over the

had separated from his nasal bridge. Later in the month it got infected again and a round of different antibiotics was started. In mid-December Henry made his last trip to the clinic. The x-rays showed that the hole had closed and no bone infection was present. He has a lumpy scar, but it just







adds character to his handsome face. As of this writing in January, it remains healed and is no longer giving Henry grief. It's about time, says Henry!!

Off he went to the vet again where they pulled out pieces of bone that The numerous vet procedures came to a total of \$2,532.31.
