Dear Supporter, November 2022

We are approaching the end of yet another year and the time has come to wish you a very Happy Holiday and Happy New Year. This is always a time of reflection for me. A time for me to look back at the year past and at what to expect in the year ahead. Finally Covid seems to be behind us and we are able to welcome visitors again. Seventy-seven new pigs have joined us at Ironwood so far this year. Oddly enough the number at this time last year was also 77. The little boy who just became the 77th is a young boar who was always escaping the lady's



yard and we suspected he had been shot. One of our staff offered to foster him if we would take him that day, so Timmy became our 77th pig for 2022. When we took him in to be neutered a week later, they found two 9mm bullets in him. One in his chest and one in his neck about 2 inches from his spine. A miracle indeed that he has survived these wounds and is doing so well.

Since our summers have now extended to the end of September, our staff has had to endure yet another month of often 3 digit temperatures. Looking ahead, I know it will only get worse in the years ahead. A huge thanks to all our staff who have made their way to Ironwood through the summer to be sure all 675 pigs are fed, watered, and their needs are met. Without them and their dedication, Ironwood would not be possible. Even more importantly,

this has all been done with a daily shortage of staff since hiring new people has been elusive. This presents a big problem as I look ahead to the New Year. So looking back over the year things have been far from easy, but whoever said rescuing so many animals would be a walk in the park. Many of you have had the experience of rescuing many animals yourselves, so you can appreciate how difficult it is.

Over the past couple of years, we are turning more and more to foster homes to take care of the unwanted pigs that I talked about in previous newsletters. We have dozens more pigs in foster homes. Many of the foster pigs have been saved from hoarding situations. They are all intact and must be separated and neutered.

Because we have been able to provide and install fencing and shelters to house many of these fosters, the process has been sped up considerably. Preventing unwanted births remains our top priority. Our foster parents have become an integral part of Ironwood and I often don't have the pleasure of meeting them or the pigs to which they are providing a home. Other volunteers and helpers make sure they are going to an appropriate home. I must admit having so many pigs in foster homes is a scary proposition. However, the number of unwanted pigs has exploded over this past year and without fosters and the financial ability to support fosters, so many more pigs would be homeless.



This is where your generous support comes in. Like our staff, without you none of this would ever be possible. None of our foster parents have ever asked for any payment. However, the cost of our community outreach program which includes providing spaying and neutering, additional medical care, feed and often fencing and shelters to all these foster pigs, has grown to nearly \$100,000 a year.

I am so very grateful to all of our foster parents who give so much of their time and love to these many pigs in need. We could never provide for all of these additional pigs at Ironwood, particularly because of the difficulty we have with staffing.

Therefore, the overwhelming takeaway from this past year is the huge surge of pigs in need of a home and the impossibility of finding sufficent employees. But another overwhelming takeaway is that you have continued to support us and because of your support we have been able to do so much for the pigs in Arizona.

Avon, seen in a previous newsletter, has metamorphosed into a beautiful, proud young lady.





Ramsey, seen with me in September's newsletter, was tied to a tree by a police office until we could arrive and bring him to safety.

Of the 77 additional pigs who have come to call Ironwood home this year, most have come to us as strays, abandoned or from hoarding situations. All were in desperate need of a safe harbor including the owner release ones.

Of all the pigs we have rescued this year with so many stories to be told, Truffles has been one of the hardest for me to accept. In August, we got a phone call about a pig in Eloy, AZ. The owner had



passed away and the owner of the property lived in Indiana. neighbor had been asked to care for Truffles, but he could no longer take care of him and asked us to come for him. Although Truffles himself was not in bad shape, his living conditions were abhorrent. He was in a tiny, filthy, dark pen thick with black muck and his water bowl was the same. He had lived that way for 8 long years that the neighbor knew about. He was a beautiful black, proud boar. Now neutered, seeing him out walking the property in the sunlight, talking with other pigs and happily accepting our affections gives me such joy. Bringing Truffles from a dark, foul, lonely hole to an entirely new life of sunshine and friends is all the reward that I could ever ask for. You can be so proud to be part of Truffles' new life and of all the others you have been a part of this year.

Thank you so much for making this yet another successful year at Ironwood. I am not sure what the year ahead will bring, but with your support I am sure many more lives will be saved as they have been for the past 21 years. Please have a Happy Healthy New Year.

Families



ronwood's current population is around 675 pigs with 77 of those being new arrivals during 2022. Part of that

influx of pigs this year included 3 mothers and their children. Elsa's owner died and none of the family members wanted to keep the pig. We were told she was the only pig at that home, so imagine our shock when Elsa

later developed a milk line! She never got very big so it was yet another surprise when she gave birth to 7 babies. One died during the first night but the remaining 6 are growing fast and doing well.

Meg arrived a couple of months later with her son, Bill. Her other 4 babies had gotten out of the poorly constructed fence at their home and disappeared into the desert. Meg had a horrible case of mastitis that had to be dealt with immediately. Mother and son are doing great these days and are looking very healthy.

The same month that Meg and Bill came, we rescued Daffodil, her four 7-week-old babies and four 2-year-old girls that most



likely are hers from a previous litter. They had all been seized by the Sheriff's Department as a result of an animal abuse case.

Because none of the people who owned Elsa, Meg and Daffodil bothered to get the girls spayed, Ironwood gained 19 pigs. There were additional expenses incurred with our new residents. Meg's mastitis required two visits to the vet clinic. Thankfully, she healed up nicely and did not need surgery. Seven of the babies were males that have since been neutered. The three moms have been spayed. The four female

babies are old enough to be spayed and will have that done soon. Meadow, Mimosa, Magnolia and Maybelline,

Daffodil's older children, are on the spay waiting list and will hopefully get done this winter. Bluebell, one of Daffodil's young babies, had surgery by an orthopedic specialist to repair a lesion in her shoulder. All of these

medical procedures added up to a hefty bill for the sanctuary.

It's disturbing to think about the number of families out there that never make it to Ironwood. The



ones we rescue and provide a permanent home for are most likely just the tip of the unseen iceberg. There is a huge problem all across the country of potbellied pigs breeding



uncontrollably at homes where the owners either don't know any better, cannot afford the cost of spay/neuter but don't ask for help until the population explosion is out of control, or they simply don't care. Babies are sold or given away only to end up



breeding elsewhere, expanding the problem. The solution to the overpopulation of pigs is this... spay and neuter. Do it before you're overrun with babies having more babies. Males are fertile at nine weeks of age while females can go into their first heat at twelve weeks. Poor Meg was only one year old when she came here with Bill. Things can get out of hand in a hurry. If you know anyone with pigs, ask if they've

had their pets altered. If not, suggest having it done. If the cost is an issue, local sanctuaries may be able to help out. It's easier to come up with the money for a couple of spay/neuter surgeries in

the beginning rather than 20 or more down the line when the babies start appearing. Please encourage pig owners to spay and neuter. It's the only answer for the future of all the pig rescue organizations already bursting at the seams.

Our three new moms and their young families were given a large yard of their own to call home. Bill is the oldest of the babies but

gets along great with the youngsters. He and Meg remain in a close relationship but enjoy the company of the other pigs. Elsa was adopted in August to become the companion to another pig. She is doing very well at her new forever home and becoming pals with

Khloe. Her babies Anna, Yelena, Pabbie, Olaf, Kristoff and Sven are healthy, happy kids that love running and playing in the big space where they live. There are shelters with blankets along with pillows and beds scattered around for them to sleep on, but their favorite place during the hot weather is under the trailer. It's a nice shaded area where all the moms and kids like to hang out. Daffodil is a very laid-back gal that spends a lot of her time lying in the shade under the trailer and

watching the kids play. Myrtle, Bluebell, Hawthorn and Jared like to snuggle with her at night when they finally tire themselves out. Much of their daytime hours are spent playing in the pools, water bowls and mud wallows. Seems



as if when one starts splashing around in the water, it's the cue for everyone to jump on in. If watching a bunch of baby pigs



playing in the water doesn't bring a smile to your face, then nothing will! Despite the fact that we truly wish people would spay and neuter their pigs so that there would no longer be any need for rescuing family units, we do love these three families so much. Because of your generous support, we can give them the best home possible where they can live long and happy lives together.







They were clambering for their meds that Deeanna was passing out which they think are treats.

Willow, her four children Jessie, Leanne, Gibson and Costner and their daddy Bernie, were all about to be put on Craigslist for free when we got a call to take them. The babies were about 5 months old when we picked them up in May of 2021. We brought the whole family to Ironwood and quickly spayed and neutered them so they could remain together as a family with no chance of more babies being born. They are growing up now, nearly two years old, and enjoy roaming through the field and hanging out together in late afternoon grazing on every last piece of hay they can find. I hope it will be possible for them to live a long and healthy life together here at Ironwood.





eadow and Mimosa are two young girls who were part of a large hoarding situation west of Marana, AZ. It was truly a horrible situation where the animals were left behind with no water or food. The water had been turned off, so they could only be given water by caring neighbors. The animals were removed from the property by Pima Animal Care Center. The pigs were taken to a horse rescue where she had set up a temporary holding pen for them. She immediately called for help and we went and picked up Daffodil and her four young babies and brought them to Ironwood in March of this year. Days later, we returned to pick up Meadow and Mimosa and their two sisters Magnolia and Maybelline. I was told by the officer that these girls were Daffodil's babies as well from an earlier litter. When we brought them to Ironwood and released them in a small field of their own, they immediately began splashing and digging in their wallows. In time, they will be released into a larger adjacent field where they can stay together as a family and grow up with many other pig friends with similar stories to tell. Their trauma is behind them now and they are living in peace with plenty of pig companions.
